Unlike a dowry, in which the woman would bring something of material value to the marriage, a bride price is some form of compensation the husband must pay before he can marry a wife. A bride price can take the form of money, cattle, wine, or other valuable goods paid to the woman's family, but it also can take a more subtle form.

Example: One common form of material culture is jewelry that indicates a person's status as married. In American culture, people wear a metal band on the ring finger of the left hand to show that they are married. In smaller, nonindustrialized societies, everyone knows everyone else, so no such sign is needed. In certain parts of India, women wear a necklace to indicate that they are married.

Why Study Material Culture? One of the problems that Garnsey and Saller cite in writing a history of the Roman Empire is that they fear that their sources are not enough to fully substantiate their analysis: as they note, "Many of the kinds of evidence on which historians of other periods rely never existed under the Principate or have not survived" (Garnsey and Saller 108).

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
